**Camp Mattatuck, 221 Mt. Tobe Rd.,
Plymouth, CT**



Camp Mattatuck is located among the rolling hills of Litchfield County. Established in 1939, the camp has 500 acres of land, 2 lakes and a pond.

From young to experienced, Mattatuck has something for everyone. Whether it is a

Tenderfoot Scout experiencing summer camp for the first time or a 16 yr. old Senior Patrol Leader riding a mountain bike through the mud pit, our varied program offers fun, education and recreation to Scouts of any age.

On the waterfront there is swimming, spring board diving, snorkeling, rowing, sliding seat sculls, canoeing kayaking, English gates, fun-yaks, sailing and the ever popular blueberry lily pads. Whitewater Merit badge goes canoeing and kayaking on the Farmington River. Take a hike around the lake and walk across the floating bridge to the 2nd Island. Hike farther and visit Lost Lake. Try fishing, it is common each week to see a Scout catch a 5 lb. bass or a 24" pickerel.

At the Archery range, our superb staff will help you pop a balloon or hit the water dunk and drench your favorite staff member or Scoutmaster. You may even get to shoot at 3-Dimensional deer, boar and bear targets on the Action Archery Trail.

During the morning troop mountain bike rides, Scouts of all ages participate. In the afternoon and evening, older Scouts can attempt riding through the mud pit.

You can climb the most famous Climbing tower in the BSA, featured on the cover of Climbing Merit Badge. Camp offers an artificial rock-climbing tower for climbers of all levels. There are troop bouldering climbs available for all ages. The older Scouts and leaders may try the overhang, the half barrel, the crack climb, the chimney climb or the two helix walls. There is a challenge for anyone while providing success for everyone. Some Scouts may go climb at the nearby White Cliffs.

PROJECT COPE (Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience) is an exciting outdoor activity that can attract and hold older boys in the Scouting program. It is designed to meet the needs of today's Scouts who are seeking greater challenges to their physical and mental abilities. PROJECT COPE is based around eight goals that form the backbone of the program. They are *Teamwork, Leadership, Planning, Communication, Trust, Self-Esteem, Decision Making and Problem Solving*. This is a weeklong morning program for Scouts 14 years of age and older, and when space permits leaders may participate also.

An exciting and fun-filled week of Scouting awaits you at **Camp Workcoeman**. Since 1924 thousands of Scouts have experienced Scouting at Camp Workcoeman. While the Scouting program has changed, the basics of Scouting have

The week begins with a rousing campfire led by the whacky Workcoeman Staff. A super week of Scouting adventure will begin each day with a polar bear swim in the morning and end with a variety of fun and challenge. Every day at Camp Workcoeman is filled with Scouting adventure, new challenges and friends new and old.

A Premiere Scouting Experience—Each morning Scouts will spend time learning the basics in the Scout Skills Program for first timers or working on the vast number of merit badges for older Scouts. Time is spent in troop activities at the rifle, shotgun, or archery ranges. *The feature area of Camp Workcoeman is the waterfront.* West Hill Lake is one of the finest lakes in Connecticut. Scouts are able to swim, snorkel, sail, kayak, canoe and test their skills with SCUBA. The program also includes endless experiences in Nature/Ecology, Scoutcraft and Handicraft. Earning First Aid merit badge or BSA Lifeguard are skills that will last forever.

Workcoeman Adventure—The challenges continue with a *25 mile overnight Bike Trek to Camp Barbour.* **Discover SCUBA** introduces you to the thrill of diving in open water. **Project COPE** is a series of obstacles and challenges designed for developing teamwork skills in groups. The climbing wall tests your skills and strength.

Discovery Program Merit Badge Clusters—Each week a set of specialty merit badges will be offered to older Scouts as a means to explore and discover career opportunities otherwise unavailable in one's Scouting experience. Some merit badges will include field trips into the surrounding community.

Canoeing, Kayaking & Tubing on the Farmington River—Nearby, the beautiful Farmington River provides opportunities for Scouts to test their canoeing and kayaking skills, or just enjoy a tube float.

June Norcross Webster Scout Reservation is located in scenic Ashford, Connecticut. Established in 1964, the reservation occupies 1,200 acres of land that is home to approximately 1,500 Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts each summer during its six-week season.

From polar bear swim in the early morning mist to a nature trek as evening shadows fall, every day at J.N.W. is packed with outdoor adventure, new challenges, and fun with new friends and old.

Scouting at its Best:

You'll spend your morning working on some of the over thirty outdoor merit badges that are available or learning basic Scout skills at First Class Path. After lunch, it's time to head for the rifle, shotgun, and archery ranges to hone your marksmanship skills, or into the lake for some swimming, boating, or for a spirited game of watermelon water polo. How about a hike or a mountain bike ride through the 1,200 wooded acres of the reservation, or an overnight trek to the Outpost? Whether it's First Aid merit badge or BSA Lifeguard, the program here will help you develop skills and create memories that will last a lifetime.

High Adventure:

Are you up to the mental and physical challenges of rock climbing? Try your hand at the cargo net and climbing wall. Climbing merit badge culminates with scaling the challenging faces of Wolf Rock in nearby Mansfield. Summer Camp Staff Opportunities

Each camp requires a staff of over 50 individuals to deliver the summer adventure of camping. Specialist are needed in all areas of camp: Aquatics, Nature/Ecology, Outdoor Skills, Shooting Sports, Health Lodge, Dining Hall and Kitchen, Trading Post, Mountain Biking, Climbing, and Commissioner's Staff. Salaries are based on position responsibility with consideration given to the applicant's experience and/or certifications. Applications are available at the Council Service Center and online.

Counselor-in-Training (CIT) Program

Scouts! If you are thinking of serving someday as a member of a camp staff, the CIT Training Program is for you. The CIT program provides a preview of what it's like to serve as a member of the summer camp staff. You'll be trained in the skills required of a good summer camp staff member and work with current staff in delivering the fun and adventure of summer camp to other Scouts. If you are selected to serve as a CIT, you will live at camp for 1 or more weeks! You'll learn program skills and teaching skills during the first week or two, and work with other staff members as you test those skills during the final week. You can also earn a merit badge or two! The CIT fee is \$125 for the first week.

Parent Information

Our Camps offer some of the finest outdoor experiences a Scout, his friends, and parents can enjoy anywhere, and here's why:

Staff: Each of our Camping programs is administered by a Nationally Certified Camp Director and all key staff are trained in their areas of responsibility. Our staff members are carefully selected and reflect the principles of Scouting.

Facilities: All of our camps feature facilities in natural surroundings. Our Boy Scout Resident Camps and Specialty Camps are held at locations that are inspected for safety, cleanliness, and program suitability.

Program: It's easy to see the benefits of the programs we offer. Of course, fun is the top priority of every boy. But, while delivering the fun, we manage to add in equal amounts of citizenship, fitness, self-esteem, and character development that are the hallmarks of Scouting.

Family Involvement: Family members may visit camp for the family night barbecue and campfire, which are scheduled as follows - Camp Mattatuck - Wednesday evenings; Camp J. N. Webster - Friday evenings; Camp Workcoeman - campfire Friday evening, Court of Honor and BBQ Saturday 11 a.m.

Financial Aid: A limited number of partial Camperships will be available to families who demonstrate a need. A confidential Campership Application is available at the Connecticut Rivers Council's office. Camperships are not typically granted in amounts greater than 50% of the camp fee. Recipients will be notified of amount awarded.

Insurance: Connecticut Rivers Council maintains an insurance policy which covers all Scouts while at camp. This policy is an excess policy, which means that benefits are paid in excess of the benefits paid by any other insurance which the individual or may have. To summarize, if your Scout is injured at camp, your personal insurance becomes primary for coverage with the camp insurance picking up any remaining amount. If no other insurance is available, the council's policy will cover expenses.

Accreditation: Each of our camps undergoes one or more safety inspections prior to and during operation. Each of our resident camps were certified as Nationally Accredited Camps by the BSA during the 2009 summer camp season.

Cancellation of Programs: The Connecticut Rivers Council reserves the right to cancel any program. Youth having made reservations for any cancelled program will be given the opportunity to make reservations for any other program being offered.

Refund Policy: PARTIAL REFUNDS for Scouts not attending camp will be given only if the unit or individual notifies the Council Service Center in writing at least 14 days prior to the unit's scheduled arrival date at camp. There will be no refunds on cancellations within two weeks of camp attendance except for medical reasons or summer school attendance. Partial refunds for cancellations due to medical reasons will require a doctor's note. Summer school will require a note from the school. \$50 of the fee for week-long programs is non-refundable and will not be returned. After June 15, contract commitments increase the non-refundable amount to \$75 regardless of the reason for the cancellation. Requests for partial refunds must be made no later than August 31. Requests made after that date will not be considered.

Non-Discrimination Policy: The programs of the Connecticut Rivers Council are available to all youth without regard to race, color, religion, disability, or national origin. Any youth member may attend any age appropriate Camp conducted within the Council, or any combination of Camps.

Confirmation Packets: Confirmation information will be mailed to all Boy Scouts and Venturers who register to attend camp as provisional (individual) campers or specialty camp participants. Information for boys attending camp with their troop is provided to their troop leaders.

Health Forms: Health forms are required for all youth and adults attending camp. Health forms** have been revised to comply with state Department of Public Health regulations. Health forms must be completed fully, with all required signatures. Parents should make a photocopy of their son's health form before submitting it to the camp or unit leader.

All campers must have a physical examination within 12 months prior to camp. Health forms must be updated and signed annually by parents or guardians and within 12 months prior to camp by a physician.

Medications: The state Department of Public Health requires that an "Authorization for the Administration of Medications" form be completed for all campers who receive medications (including over-the-counter medications) at camp. This form must be signed by a physician **and** a parent or guardian.

Philmont 2011

Philmont Scout Ranch is the Boy Scouts of America's oldest national high-adventure base. It covers 137,000 acres - about 214 square miles - of rugged mountain wilderness in the Sangre de Cristo (Blood of Christ) range of the Rocky Mountains in northern New Mexico.

Philmont's signature program is the **High-Adventure Expedition**. Each 12-day expedition provides opportunities for participants to

- Explore the high country in the Sangre de Cristo Mountains.
- Experience the thrill of climbing mountains over two miles high.
- Participate in a wide array of activities that teach Scouting skills—archaeology, backpacking, camping, climbing, fishing, forestry, horsemanship, Indian lore, and *much* more.
- Develop leadership, group dynamics, wilderness problem-solving, and outdoor skills.



Crews hike Philmont's mountains, spending nights at various backcountry camps. At staffed camps, crews can participate in a variety of programs presented by Philmont backcountry staff. Among these are horseback riding, gold panning, and interpretive programs such as homesteading and mountain man rendezvous.

A **once-in-a-lifetime, mountaintop experience** awaits our contingent of Scouts or Venturers as each crew conquers the challenge of a Philmont trek!!

The 2011 Council Contingent will consist of 5 crews, maximum of 12 persons each and subject to Philmont's youth/adult ratio. The dates are July 3—17, 2011. The projected cost is \$1,750.

Venturing Odyssey The 2009 Odyssey is a unique overnight opportunity for Venturers, Sea Scouts and their units. The overnight is designed for fellowship with the opportunity to work on some Outdoor Skills as well as network with fellow Scouts in the Venturing program. The open program includes a themed beach party, **Pistol Shooting, Sailing, Kayaking, Land Navigation and Skeet Shooting.** This is a Coeducational program under the supervision of BSA trained camp staff and trained Venturing Crew Advisors. **COME AS A CREW/SHIP or COME PROVO.** Program starts 10 a.m. on Saturday and concludes at noon on Sunday.

AdVenture Camp is a challenging program for Scouts 13 or older and Venturers. Participants select one of four core programs.

- The Aquatics core offers advanced whitewater kayaking and an opportunity to earn the BSA Lifeguard Award.

Certification is available to both youth and adults and identifies the individual as a Leave No Trace Trainer capable of educating and guiding units in accordance with the proper ways of backcountry camping.

REFUND POLICY - PARTIAL REFUNDS for Scouts not attending camp will be given only if the unit or individual notifies the Council Service Center in writing at least 14 days prior to the unit's scheduled arrival date at camp. There will be no refunds on cancellations within two weeks of camp attendance except for medical reasons or summer school attendance. Partial refunds for cancellations due to medical reasons will require a doctor's note. Summer school will require a note from the school. \$50 of the fee for week-long programs is non-refundable and will not be returned. After June 15, contract commitments increase the non-refundable amount to \$75 regardless of the reason for the cancellation. Requests for partial refunds must be made no later than August 31. Requests made after that date will not be considered.
